

Miami's Oseas De Leon Named to USA Blind Soccer Men's National Team

Miami Lighthouse instructor among seven athletes with visual impairments selected

(April 5, 2024) – Oseas De Leon, a Miami resident and Senior Technology Specialist at the Miami Lighthouse for the Blind and Visually Impaired, has been selected for the 2024 USA Blind Soccer Men's National Team and is a Paralympic hopeful for the LA28 Paralympic Games. De Leon is one of two new athletes selected for this year's USA Blind Soccer Men's National Team.

The U.S. Association of Blind Athletes (USABA) announced nine athletes chosen for the 2024 USA Blind Soccer Men's National Team following a selection camp in Chula Vista, Calif., in February. The roster features seven athletes with visual impairments along with two sighted goalkeepers.

"We're elated to hear the news from USABA that our Senior Technology Specialist, Oseas De Leon, has officially made the 2024 USA Blind Soccer Men's National Team and is a Paralympic hopeful for the LA28 Paralympic Games," said **Virginia Jacko**, President & CEO of Miami Lighthouse for the Blind and Visually Impaired. "His hard work, perseverance, and dedication to the sport he loves so much is an inspiring story for other blind and visually impaired athletes to chase their dreams. From everyone at Miami Lighthouse, Oseas, we're so proud of you!"

The sport of blind soccer has been part of the Paralympic Games since 2004, but the U.S. has never fielded a team. That will all change in 2028 when Los Angeles plays host to the Olympic and Paralympic Games and the U.S. will receive an automatic entry into the blind soccer competition as the host country. The first USA Blind Soccer National Team was named in November 2022 and competed in two international friendlies against Canada in March 2023, winning by scores of 1-0 and 3-0.

"We are so glad to have Oseas part of the National Team for 2024," said USA Blind Soccer Head Coach **Katie Smith**. "He has attended the last two national team camps in October 2023 and February 2024. He is a skilled player and a team player on and off the pitch. Oseas is always speaking positively with the team and is constantly motivating everyone around him. His positivity is contagious, and we are excited to see what he brings to the 2024 USA Blind Soccer Men's National Team."

Despite their lack of vision, blind soccer players exemplify speed, strength, stamina, agility, and excellent spatial awareness. Blind soccer is a fast-paced and exciting game, played in more than 60 countries, and is the world's fastest-growing Paralympic sport. With grassroots efforts to introduce the sport to

children, teens, and adults across the U.S., USABA is committed to bringing play equity and accessibility to the largest global sport in the world.
