Miami Lighthouse's Pre-Employment Transition Services teaches students a variety of necessary skills, including home and personal management, assistive technology, job readiness, and community orientation, along with employment skills such as keeping up-to-date resumes, job interviewing, and the use of business technology.

The organization is also expanding its current workforce development training through Job Readiness and Placement Classes to continue equipping blind and visually impaired individuals with the tools they need to reach their full potential in their next career move.
